

They and their ancestors are white canadian settlers of Scottish, Irish, and Swedish heritage. They were assigned [redacted] at birth, and belatedly reassigned boyish notagirl twenty some odd years later.

Kelly's work uses humour, play, and interactivity to engage the viewer, who is asked to collaborate in complicating dominant narratives of gender, sexuality, taste, class, labour, leisure, emotion, and virtue. With skills in a wide range of mediums, including sculpture, painting, printmaking, digital design, and fibre work, projects often take shape based on which medium the artist is currently obsessed with.
